Australia's VET Sector

4.2 million students annually

Qualifications/skill sets delivered by >4450 providers

- 4016 ASQA regulated RTOs (approximately 89.9%)
- 450 VIC/WA regulated RTOs (approximately 10.1%)

Larger providers

- Top 30 providers represent >1m students, or 25% of all students
- Top 1100 providers (almost 25% of total providers) represent almost 90% of all students

Smaller providers

- Very large proportion of about 2000 providers (around 40% of total providers)
 with 100 or fewer students
- Approximately 3500 providers (approximately 75% of total providers) represent only 10% of all students


VET regulation

Community-based adult education RTOs

- ASQA regulates 181 community-based adult education providers (4.5% of all ASQA-regulated providers)
- In 2017, there were 109 264 enrolments with these providers across all states and territories (3% of total enrolments)
- Since ASQA's establishment in 2011, ASQA has conducted at least one audit activity in relation to 122 of these providers.

A busy year!

- Review of NVR Act
- International Education Strategic Review
- Introduction of new fees and charges model
- Development of stronger controls on market entry (for full implementation in 2018-19)
- Completion of roll-out of student-centred audit approach
- Continuing close scrutiny of training and education qualifications
- Implementation of recommendations about unduly short training strategic review.

Review of NVR Act

- Review conducted by Professor Valerie Braithwaite with final report released on 22 June 2018
- 23 recommendations intended to drive continuous improvement in the quality of education and training and in the protection of students' rights
- Australian Government indicated its support for several of the review's recommendations
- ASQA will work with the Australian Government
 Department of Education and Training to progress those recommendations.

International Education Strategic Review

- Announced in 2017
- Review of issues including:
 - growth and associated risks
 - monitoring offshore markets
 - how providers manage third parties (agents)
 - coordination between agencies
 - data and information
 - how can ASQA support quality and testing risk indicators.

New fees and charges structure

- New fees implemented from July 2018
- Structure of fees and charges was revised to support providers that consistently demonstrate quality and compliance
- Incentives for compliance with most significant costs at the point of audit.

Enhanced scrutiny of new entrants

- Effective 1 July 2018
- Protecting both students and the market in which established providers operate
- Stronger financial viability requirements to ensure sustainable businesses
- Two-year initial registration period
- More disclosure on individuals associated with applicants
- 2018-19 focus is on identity verification and 'Fit and Proper Person' requirements.

Roll-out of student-centred audit approach

- Commenced in 2016-17
- Full implementation in 2017-18 including:
 - now applies to CRICOS providers
 - revised users' guide following the student journey
 - commencement of student surveys
 - new, streamlined audit report format.

Trainer and assessor capability

VET workforce capability directly affects the sector quality:

- from 2017 ASQA began applying increased scrutiny on all providers seeking to add TAE training products to scope
- ASQA has implemented a monitoring strategy for RTOs delivering TAE units of competency and qualifications
- ongoing focus on education to promote quality assessment practice (including through the updated *Users' Guide to the* Standards for RTOs 2015 and discussion of common compliance issues with Standard 1.8).

Implementation of recommendations from unduly short training strategic review

- Recommendations designed to clarify the regulatory architecture, allow training product developers to set a recommended amount of training, and improve the information available to consumers
- Public consultations with VET stakeholders and discussion paper released with submissions closed 9 March 2018
- The Australian Government is yet to announce the outcome from this consultation process
- Unduly short training remains an ongoing risk; ASQA continues to focus on this in its audits of individual providers.

2018-19

The year ahead

ASQA's key priorities include:

- ASQA Regulatory Strategy 2018-20
 - target area 1: Australia's international education sector
 - target area 2: Trainer and assessor capability
 - strategic initiatives:
 - further work relating to the Government response to the NVR Act Review
 - implementation of 'Raising the Bar' project new market entrants
 - increased regulatory scrutiny on four training products of concern.
