



- Jobseekers managed by CES






Referring callers - now

Challenges facing literacy and numeracy sector

Lack of:

- national adult literacy policy
- 2. adult literacy programs for non-jobseekers
- 3. diversity of provision
- 4. funded workplace literacy & numeracy programs
- 5. suitable provision for Indigenous learners in R &R locations
- 6. adult literacy workforce







1. Lack of a national adult literacy policy

A national policy will

- give consistency across states
- ensure strong ongoing funding and broad access
- support research and curriculum direction
- support quality LLN resource development
- ensure adequate specialist adult LLN teaching workforce



2. Lack of adult literacy programs for non-jobseekers


- free, accessible, timely and appropriate options decreasing
- non-jobseeker funding more limited
- classes are needed for:
 - ✓ workers
 - ✓ people with intellectual disabilities
 - ✓ youth at risk
 - ✓ parents of school age children
 - ✓ over 65's





Aren't most people covered by SEE?

- No over 80% of our callers aren't eligible
- Little change in callers in 25 years



3. Lack of diversity of provision

- strong focus on accredited training delivered by RTOs
- need a range of delivery options
- need for a return to student-centred learning and assessment
- need for a national distance provider (non-SEE)







4. Lack of funded workplace literacy numeracy program

- closure of Commonwealth WELL program
- increase literacy demands in workplaces
- few employers fund the cost of LLN training and resources





5. Lack of suitable provision for Indigenous learners in rural & remote areas

- need for English as additional language classes or learning centres
- not eligible for AMEP
- online learning may not be suitable.
- need for an English literacy program for Indigenous adults







6. De- professionalisation of adult literacy workforce

- huge decline in specialist teachers nationally
- no specialist adult literacy training offered face to face anywhere in Australia.
- Cert IV TAE not adequate for teaching in this challenging specialist field
- adult numeracy expertise critically endangered

• shortage - limit implementation of many recommendations of Joyce

report





Creative ways Hotline is tackling needs
